Application Deadline Approaches for Single Parent Scholarship Fund of Northwest Arkansas Traditional Scholarships

Single Parents May Apply for Summer 2021 Traditional Scholarship Funds Until March

15

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (Feb. 15, 2021) – The Single Parent Scholarship Fund of Northwest Arkansas (SPSF) announced today the deadline to apply for its summer semester traditional scholarships is March 15. The SPSF offers scholarships for single parents enrolled in eligible programs at any of over 20 approved area universities, community colleges or trade schools.

Scholarship recipients can receive \$2,000 if they are full-time students and \$1,000 if they are attending school part time.

To be eligible, applicants must be a single parent pursuing a career-oriented course of study to ensure a better standard of living for their family. Applicants must be living at or near the poverty level, have a high school diploma or a GED diploma, and be an applicant of the Pell Grant. Additional eligibility requirements apply.

Approved institutions of study include the University of Arkansas, Arkansas State University, Northwest Technical Institute, Paul Mitchell The School, Northwest Arkansas Community College and Harding University. A full list of approved institutions of study and eligibility requirements can be found on the SPSF website.

The Single Parent Scholarship Fund of Northwest Arkansas works to help low-income, single parents who are pursuing higher education as their family's pathway out of poverty through financial assistance.
